## 2024-25 District 2750 Conference Recap

District 2750 Conference, held over two days from February 28th to March 1st, has concluded successfully. I was pleased to see active participation by so many Rotarians, Rotaractors, and members of the Rotary family, including our friends from Pacific Basin Group who came all the way to join us. For the first time, the plenary session was held on a Saturday. The venue was full, and many people stayed until the end, which I think is one of the benefits of holding the conference on a Saturday.

The theme of this year's conference was “Connect with Us! District 2750 - Looking to the Origin and the Future”. As mentioned in my last month's message, the District Conference is a great opportunity for everyone in District 2750 to come together to meet, learn, and be inspired. We have spent a great deal of time thinking about what we can do to make the program meaningful for everyone who attends, and to make them feel glad that they come. The District Conference Committee and the District Committees in charge of each of the programs have made this happen. Throughout the preparation, we were particularly conscious of the following points.

First is the “District Status Report” as governor. To help you understand the action plan in concrete terms, I presented it in accordance with the “Four Strategic Priorities”.

We also invited Rotaract Clubs, who now have RI membership same as Rotary Clubs, to officially participate in the conference and present their current status.

I have had the opportunity to participate in various Rotary programs since I was Governor-nominee designate. Through my participation, I have learned the significance and results of each program. I was especially moved by the programs for

young people, such as the Youth Programs, because I witnessed how much they learned and how much they grew as a result of these programs. However, it is also true that many people do not have the opportunity to be involved in or participate in these programs, and many do not even know that they exist. Therefore, I wanted to share with you at this year's district conference how wonderful, meaningful, and successful these programs are. Although we did not have enough time, I hope that you were able to feel the greatness and future possibilities of those who have learned through the Youth Exchange, RYLA, Yoneyama Memorial Foundation Scholarship, Rotary Foundation Scholarship, and Rotary Peace Fellowship programs. I would like to once again ask for your understanding and support with these programs.

Furthermore, the special lecture was given by Dr. Naoyuki Kawahara, who has been working mainly in Sudan, a conflict zone, with the words “Live for the sake of others” in his heart. Dr. Kawahara, who is a physician, is engaged in various activities centered around healthcare for the local community, and he is practicing all of Rotary's seven areas of focus. I am sure that many people were moved by Dr. Kawahara's story, and it made them rethink about Rotary's activities and peace.

This year, for the first time in our district, we welcomed the RI president's representative from Brazil. Welcoming Mr. and Mrs. Vasconcelos, I believe this conference was a good opportunity to experience the international nature of Rotary.

I hope that this district conference has provided an opportunity for everyone to reaffirm the essence of Rotary, its goals, and to deepen and expand the connections among those gathered.
