
Governor's MONTHLY LETTER

Let's welcome new friends, and deepen our bonds of fellowship.

This year, our RI President Francesco Arezzo assumed office under rather sudden circumstances, and as such, official translations of his speeches and messages have not yet been widely circulated. Therefore, in this month's Governor's Newsletter, I would like to share some insights into his thinking, derived from his speech at the closing ceremony of the Rotary International Convention. President Arezzo described this year's presidential theme, "Unite for Good," as an exceptionally concise and powerful message, and he elaborated on its meaning. The word "Unite" calls for the participation of all members, but it also implies engaging a broader circle—local governments, other volunteer organizations, and beyond-thus expanding the base of those involved. He emphasized that the more people we bring together, the more impactful our results can be. Furthermore, "Unite" also refers to a connection

across time. In order to truly change lives, he stressed the importance of having a long-term vision, rather than focusing on short-term, one-year

President Arezzo also announced three key areas of emphasis: Polio eradication, Membership, and Peace. Incidentally, the focus areas I have set for our district this year are Polio eradication, the Environment, and Peace. They are nearly identical—and in his speech, he noted that "environmental issues are also connected to peace." Similarly, I have conveyed that membership growth is one of the most crucial themes for our clubs. In this regard, I feel that my vision is completely aligned with President Arezzo' s.

On polio eradication, he declared with great conviction, "We will finish the job!"

On membership growth, in contrast to his predecessor Mr. Martins de Camargo —who raised a passionate rallying cry, "Membership! Membership! Membership!"—President Arezzo calmly stated,

"The most effective way to increase our membership is, first and foremost, to improve our member retention rate." I wholeheartedly agree with this perspective.

On peace, he remarked, "This is what we do best. Nearly all of our activities contribute to peace."

In concluding his speech, he emphasized the strength of diverse teams and left us with these moving words, "Everyone has many dreams stored away in their drawer. Let's connect those dreams and create one big dream—a dream that excites us, brings us together, and changes the world."

From his speech, I sensed his gentle personality, the guiet passion that lies beneath, and his romantic heart that deeply believes in Rotary and its power to do good. I found his words to be a great source of courage and inspiration. I am more committed than ever to faithfully pursue the three themes of Polio Eradication, the Environment, and Peace, and to promote membership activities that focus on retention.

Now, August is Membership and New Club Development Month. I trust that your clubs have already begun implementing your year-long membership strategies as part of your club strategic plans. I encourage you to include initiatives such as, "Establishing new membership types", "Organizing strategic open meetings", "Creating satellite clubs". These strategies were presented to club presidents during PETS in March, and I look forward to discussing them further during my upcoming official club visits.

As times change, let us gradually evolve our club culture and become ever more vibrant and attractive clubs. Membership growth means welcoming new friends. Member retention means deepening bonds with those friends. Throughout the year, let us continue to welcome new friends and strengthen the bonds that unite us.
