About “DEI”

Happy New Year. I sincerely hope that each of you has welcomed the New Year in good health and high spirits. I would like to express my deepest gratitude for your exceptional support and cooperation throughout the past year.

At the 54th Rotary Institute held in November, RI Director Mr. Mizuno reported that the term “DEI” (Note 1) has been formally removed from the Rotary Code of Policies.

Given that DEI has, in recent years, been positioned as a core concept in Rotary club operations, its removal is expected to have a significant impact on how clubs are managed going forward. For this reason, I would like to focus on this topic in this month’s Governor’s Message.

Below is a summary of the key points announced by Rotary International (RI).

Background:

In 2025, U.S. President Donald Trump signed an executive order terminating the use of “DEI” across all federal government agencies and strongly encouraged private-sector organizations to do the same. As Rotary International is an organization governed by the laws of the State of Illinois in the United States, non-compliance with this executive order could have resulted in the loss of certain rights, including tax-exempt status. In light of this risk, RI decided to comply with the order.

Renaming of the Committee:

As a result, the RI DEI Advisory Council has been renamed the “Enhancing Participant Engagement Committee.” In line with this change at the international level, districts are also encouraged to rename their corresponding committees and transition to new roles aligned with this updated focus.

Purpose:

The purpose of this renaming is to further increase Rotary’s overall impact.

Engagement (Note 2), belonging (Note 3), accessibility (Note 4), and club culture are intended to be embedded holistically into the Rotary experience, rather than addressed as isolated initiatives.

Explanation:

While the name has changed, the direction we are pursuing has not. Respecting diversity as a core value, it remains essential to integrate engagement, belonging, and accessibility into the daily experiences of all participants.

This change directly supports two priorities of the Rotary Action Plan (Note 5), namely “Expand Our Reach” and “Enhance Participant

Engagement.”

The above is a summary of RI’s announcement. While it is commendable that the background and rationale were clearly explained, the frequent use of English terminology may still make certain aspects difficult to understand without annotations. Accordingly, I would like to share my own interpretation below.

Although the term “DEI” has been removed, concepts such as engagement, belonging, and accessibility will now be positioned at the core of future club operations. In other words, Rotary seeks to create club environments in which everyone can participate without barriers, express their individuality, remain motivated to engage in Rotary activities, and connect with one another in a spirit of mutual respect.

Even though terminology and committee names may change, I believe that Rotary’s fundamental philosophy rooted in its Five Core Values (Note 6) remains unchanged. While clubs will need to respond to specific changes in naming and structure in due course, I encourage each club to continue valuing its unique culture, while also drawing on RI’s announcement to incorporate changes that reflect the times and further energize club activities.

RI has clearly stated that it will soon provide updated resources to support this transition. Let us remain attentive to RI’s future developments and look forward with anticipation to the resources that will be made available.

Note 1: Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI)

Adopted in 2019:

“We believe that we must embrace diversity, equity, and inclusion in all of Rotary’s activities and demonstrate it through our actions.”

Note 2: Engagement

A state in which participants feel aligned with Rotary’s mission and are highly motivated to take part in its activities.

Note 3: Belonging

A sense of identifying the club as one’s own place, accompanied by psychological safety and emotional attachment.

Note 4: Accessibility

A condition in which participation is easy and open to all, regardless of age, gender, or physical ability.

Note 5: Rotary Action Plan (Four Priorities)

Adopted in 2018:

Increase Our Impact / Expand Our Reach / Enhance Participant Engagement / Increase Our Ability to Adapt

Note 6: The Five Core Values of Rotary

Adopted in 2007:

Service / Fellowship / Diversity / Integrity / Leadership
