### About the District Conference

This month, our District Conference will be held on Friday the 6th and Saturday the 7th.

This Rotary year, the main conference will take place at Tachikawa Stage Garden, a concert hall located in Tachikawa, which serves as the central city of the Tama Central Group, to which I belong.

You may wonder why we chose Tachikawa as the venue. I have summarized my thoughts below, and in this month's Governor's Monthly Message, I would like to share the significance of holding our District Conference in Tachikawa.

#### 1. Promoting District Unity

Tachikawa is a major transportation hub in the Tama area, making it easily accessible from across the region. By holding the District Conference here, we aim to create an opportunity for members from both central Tokyo and the Tama area to gather on equal footing and reaffirm our district as one united team.

#### 2. Visualizing Our Connection with the Local Community

Tachikawa is a city where government, healthcare, education, and cultural industries converge, offering many model examples of regional collaboration. Through the District Conference, we hope to communicate—both internally and externally—how Rotary walks alongside local communities and contributes to solving regional challenges.

#### 3. Youth Development and a Future-Oriented Message

With many young people and families, Tachikawa is also symbolic as a venue to showcase Rotaract, Interact, and Youth Service activities. I believe this setting clearly conveys Rotary's commitment to standing together with the generations who will shape our future.

#### 4. Diversity and Inclusion

Tachikawa is a city where diverse cultures and values intersect, aligning well with modern Rotary's emphasis on diversity, equity, and inclusion (although DEI has recently been removed from the Rotary Code of Policies). Holding our conference here represents, in my view, a statement of our commitment to an open and inclusive Rotary.

#### 5. The Governor's Vision

The District Conference is the occasion where a Governor's vision is most strongly expressed. Holding it in Tachikawa—a city where people gather and connect to the future—powerfully demonstrates the continuity of service and the growth of our district, while also pointing toward Rotary's

future direction.

I realize this may sound somewhat formal. At its heart, however, the District Conference is a precious opportunity for Rotarians across the district to come together, deepen fellowship, and gain fresh insights and inspiration. By hosting it in the Tama area—and at a non-hotel venue—we hope you will sense Rotary's diversity and spirit of innovation, and enjoy this new approach. We sincerely look forward to welcoming many participants.

By the way, did you know that a District Conference was previously held in Tachikawa?

In fact, in 1980—the year Tokyo's Rotary district was divided and our district became District 275—the District Conference under our first Governor, Reijiro Hattori, was held on the first day at a community center in Tachikawa and on the second day in Shinjuku.

Governor Hattori expressed his thoughts in his Governor's Monthly Message (I searched the Rotary Library for those records). In it, he spoke of "Rotary's evolution and revolution," quoting Paul Harris: "Rotary must be evolutionary all of the time and revolutionary some of the time."

As part of that vision, the conference was intentionally scheduled on Friday and Saturday, with the first day held in Tachikawa—and notably, not at a hotel.

More than 45 years later, I find that Governor Hattori's aspirations resonate deeply with my own. This makes our District Conference in Tachikawa even more meaningful to me. With renewed respect for the history passed down by our Rotary predecessors, and as one who continues that legacy, I strongly feel a responsibility to contribute even more to the future development of our district.

Revolution: Dramatic and fundamental change

Innovation: Change that creates value with new technologies and ideas

\*While revolution often involves sudden disruption, innovation is closer to evolution in the sense that it advances social and economic progress. In recent years, Rotary International has increasingly favored the concept of innovation.
